



Tara Beagan is a proud Ntlaka'pamux and Irish "Canadian" halfbreed. She is cofounder/ director of ARTICLE 11 with Andy Moro, based in Mohkinstsis. Beagan served as

Artistic Director of Native Earth Performing Arts from February 2011 to December 2013. She's been writer-in-rez at Cahoots Theatre, NEPA, the National Arts Centre, Berton House and, during pandemic times, at Prairie Theatre Exchange. Seven of her 32 plays are published. Beagan was awarded the 2020 Siminovitch Prize for theatre, playwriting, becoming the first Indigenous laureate.





ANDY NORO SET AND VIDEO DESIGNER

Andy Moro is the co-founding Artistic Director of **ARTICLE 11 Cultural Industry with Tara Beagan. Their** most recent live work Deer Woman met critical acclaim at the Edinburgh and Sydney Festivals Arts Centre Melbourne, and Kia Mau, Aotearoa. The 2020 video interpretation commissioned by Downstage and the NACIT screens regularly. ARTICLE 11 is currently in production for a cinematic work *Reckoning* and the short documentary *Hasalala Danxalax* commissioned by the Chan Centre featuring Marion Newman and Friends performing from the Indigenous opera canon. Andy is an ongoing collaborator with the Dancers of Damelahamid, Kaha:wi Dance Theatre and A'nó:wara Dance Theatre. Pandemic design includes The War Being Waged by Darla Contois at Prairie Theatre Exchange; Tomson Highway's *Post Mistress* at RMTC; *Time Stands Still* with Making Treaty 7; and SkyDancers for A'no:wara. Presently Andy is designing Walter Borden's *The Last Epistle of Tightrope Time* at the NAC which will premiere at Neptune this summer. Upcoming is Tomson Highway's Rez Sisters at RMTC directed by Tracey Nepinak and Caravan Theatre's Black Horse. ARTICLE 11 is currently Artistic Directing APTN's Indigenous Day Live 2022 performance and broadcast from the Forks in Winnipeg on June 18.





SANANTHA SANANTHA MCCUE COSTUME DESIGNER

Samantha McCue (she/her) is Anishinaabekwe from the Chippewas of Georgina Island and Ned'u'ten from Lake Babine First Nation. She grew up on the Musqueam Reserve in Vancouver, BC, and currently lives in Ottawa. Samantha graduated from York University's Theatre Production program in 2017. Selected design credits include: *Little Red Warrior and His Lawyer* (Belfry Theatre), *I Am William* (Stratford Festival); *Honour Beat* (The Grand); *Aqsarniit* (Confederation Centre of the Arts); *Kamloopa* (Western Canada Theatre); *The Monument* (Factory Theatre); *Thanks For Giving* (Arts Club Theatre Company).



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
